Vocab and notes

() N zhngwén shu de zhǎn hō! 'You speak Chinese really well!' Note how zhngwén comes before the verb and how you do it comes after, preceded by adverbial de.
() Zhǎn de ma? 'Really?'
()() W juéde hái yu hǎn dà de jìnbù kǎngjīn nē. 'I feel I still have a lot of room for improvement.' Sentences with hái 'still' often have nē at the end. tèbié liúli 'especially/really fluent'
hh (sound of laughter)
() N xué zhngwén du jǐle? 'How long have you been learning Chinese?' du jǐ 'how long' (Note how time duration comes after the verb.) The le at the end of this sentence implies that the action is continuing, cf. English 'have been ...ing'.
Dàgài sn nián le ba. Dàgài 'about'. The ba indicates uncertainty.
néng 'can'
Zhǎn bù róngyǐ. 'That's quite something.'
() N du shì zìxué de la? 'Have you done it all by self study?' De adds a matter-of-fact tone. La = le + a
... rúgu yùdào bù dǎng de, w jiù... 'if I meet something I don't understand, I (then)...'. Yùdào is a [Resultative complement](#).
() Tmēn du fīcháng yuànyì bng w. 'They're all very willing to help me.'
() Nà n néng dú hé xī ma? 'So you can read and write?'
() Ky, búguò hái bú tài hō. 'I can but I'm not very good yet.'
rèn 'recognize'
() Nà bù shōla. Zhǎn lìhài. 'That's quite (lit. 'not') a few. (Quite) amazing!
() N guōjīngla. 'You are exaggerating.'
() N hái huì bié de yǎn ma? 'Can you also speak other languages?' See [hui](#).
rìy 'Japanese language'
déy 'German language'
() Y gn Zhngwén shu de yíyàng hō ma? 'Do you also speak them as well as you speak Chinese?' ...() gn yíyàng 'as ... as'
() W juéde ynggī chàbudu ba. 'I think it must be roughly the same.'
niú 'ox; awesome'. In Taiwan, the expression can be replaced by qiáng or lìhài.
